Introduction

This report is based on findings from a nationally representative survey – *Climate Change in the American Mind* – conducted by the <u>Yale Program on Climate Change Communication</u> (<u>climatecommunication.yale.edu</u>) and the <u>George Mason University Center for Climate Change Communication</u> (<u>climatechangecommunication.org</u>). Interview dates: April 7 – 17, 2020. Interviews: 1,029 adults (18+), 911 of whom are registered to vote. Average margin of error for registered voters: +/- 3 percentage points at the 95% confidence level. The research was funded by the 11th Hour Project, the Energy Foundation, the MacArthur Foundation, and the Grantham Foundation.

Reading notes

- This report includes only registered voters.
- References to Republicans and Democrats throughout include respondents who initially identify as either a Republican or Democrat, as well as those who do not initially identify as a Republican or Democrat but who say they "are closer to" one of those parties (i.e., "leaners") in a follow-up question. The category "Independents" does not include any of these "leaners."
- In all tables, bases specified are unweighted, but percentages are weighted.
- For tabulation purposes, percentage points are rounded to the nearest whole number. As a result, percentages in a given chart may total slightly higher or lower than 100%. Summed response categories (e.g., "strongly support" + "somewhat support") are rounded after sums are calculated (e.g., 25.3% + 25.3% = 50.6%, which, after rounding, would be reported as 25% + 25% = 51%).
- Weighted percentages among registered voters of each of the groups discussed in this report:
 - ➤ Democrats (total) including leaners: 45%
 - o Liberal Democrats: 23%
 - o Moderate/Conservative Democrats: 22%
 - (Moderate Democrats: 19%; Conservative Democrats: 2%)
 - ➤ Independents excluding leaners: 8%
 - ➤ Republicans (total) including leaners: 42%
 - o Liberal/Moderate Republicans: 16%
 - (Liberal Republicans: 1%; Moderate Republicans: 14%)
 - o Conservative Republicans: 27%
 - ➤ No party/Not interested in politics/No response: 5% (included in results reported for "All Registered Voters" only)
- In the data tables reporting results for all waves of data collection, "--" denotes that there were no responses in that cell, whereas "0" denotes that there were responses, but the cell value is less than 0.5. In all other tables, "0" denotes that the cell value is between 0.0 and 0.5.





Executive Summary

Drawing on a nationally representative survey (N = 1,029; including 911 registered voters), this report describes how Democratic, Independent, and Republican registered voters view global warming, climate and energy policies, and personal and collective action. This survey was fielded from April 7 – 17, 2020, during which time a large percentage of the U.S. population was sheltering at home due to the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) epidemic. Social science theory and prior research suggest that people have a "finite pool of worry," such that worrying about one issue will decrease concern about other issues. In a national survey on American Responses to COVID-19, conducted separately from this survey, we found that most American adults were quite worried about COVID-19 in April, and justifiably so given the large number of deaths and serious illnesses it was causing at the time. Given the finite pool of worry hypothesis, we were prepared to find dramatically reduced levels of concern about climate change in this survey. However, the results of the current report on the politics of global warming are remarkably consistent with our recent report on Americans' global warming beliefs and attitudes. This is not to say that the finite pool of worry hypothesis is correct or incorrect, as we did not formally test it. But what is clear is that public engagement in the issue of climate change remains at or near historic high levels.

Specifically, in this report we found:

Global Warming Beliefs and Attitudes

- Most registered voters (75%) think global warming is happening, including 98% of liberal Democrats, 92% of moderate/conservative Democrats, and 69% of liberal/moderate Republicans. Fewer conservative Republicans (47%) think global warming is happening.
- A majority of registered voters (61%) think global warming is caused mostly by human activities. This includes 92% of liberal Democrats, 77% of moderate/conservative Democrats, and half of liberal/moderate Republicans (50%), but only 30% of conservative Republicans.
- Two in three registered voters (66%) are worried about global warming, including 97% of liberal Democrats, 85% of moderate/conservative Democrats, and 55% of liberal/moderate Republicans. Only about one in four conservative Republicans (27%) are worried.

Global Warming as a Voting Issue

- About four in ten registered voters (43%) say a candidate's position on global warming will be "very important" when they decide who they will vote for in the 2020 presidential election.
- Of 30 issues we asked about, registered voters indicated that global warming is the 13th most highly ranked voting issue (based on the percentage saying it is "very important"). It is ranked most highly among Democrats it is the 2nd most highly ranked issue for liberal Democrats and the 8th most highly ranked issue for moderate/conservative Democrats.
- When then asked to choose their *most important issue* when voting for a candidate, four percent of registered voters chose global warming, making it the *9 highest ranked *most important issue*. Global warming is the *2 *most important issue* for liberal Democrats (10%) and *9 among moderate/conservative Democrats (4%).

- Overall, registered voters are much more likely to vote for a presidential candidate who supports taking action to reduce global warming (49% are more likely and 16% are less likely a net difference of +33 percentage points). Liberal Democrats, moderate/conservative Democrats, Independents, and liberal/moderate Republicans are all more likely to vote for such a candidate. Conservative Republicans, by contrast, are less likely to vote for such a candidate.
- Overall, registered voters are also much *less* likely to vote for a presidential candidate who *opposes* taking action to reduce global warming (55% are less likely and 10% are more likely a net difference of -45 percentage points). Liberal Democrats, moderate/conservative Democrats, Independents, and liberal/moderate Republicans are all less likely to vote for such a candidate. Conservative Republicans are marginally *more* likely to vote for a candidate who opposes climate action.
- Six in ten registered voters say the candidates' views on global warming will be either the most important single issue (3%) or one of several important issues (57%) in determining their vote for president in 2020. The percentage of Democrats who say the candidates' views on global warming will be important in determining their vote for president has increased by 14 percentage points since we asked this question at the same point in the 2016 presidential election cycle (March 2016).

Global Warming and Energy Policies

Majorities of registered voters support specific policies to reduce carbon pollution and promote clean energy. These include:

- Funding more research into renewable energy sources such as solar and wind (87% of registered voters, 96% of Democrats, 85% of Independents, and 78% of Republicans).
- Generating renewable energy on public land in the U.S. (86% of registered voters, 93% of Democrats, 89% of Independents, and 78% of Republicans).
- Providing tax rebates to people who purchase energy-efficient vehicles or solar panels (83% of registered voters, 92% of Democrats, 82% of Independents, and 75% of Republicans).
- Regulating carbon dioxide as a pollutant (76% of registered voters, 93% of Democrats, 76% of Independents, and 57% of Republicans).

Large majorities of registered voters also support:

- A Revenue-Neutral Carbon Tax described as: "Requiring fossil fuel companies to pay a carbon tax and using the money to reduce other taxes (such as income tax) by an equal amount" is supported by 68% of registered voters (85% of Democrats, 68% of Independents, and 49% of Republicans).
- **Fee and Dividend** described as: "Requiring fossil fuel companies to pay a fee on carbon pollution, and distributing the money collected to all U.S. citizens, in equal amounts, through monthly dividend checks" is supported by 60% of registered voters (76% of Democrats, 57% of Independents, and 42% of Republicans).





Fewer registered voters support policies to increase fossil-fuel production, including:

- Expanding oil and natural gas drilling off the U.S. coast (50% of registered voters, 31% of Democrats, 55% of Independents, and 71% of Republicans).
- Drilling and mining fossil fuels on public land in the U.S. (45% of registered voters, 23% of Democrats, 45% of Independents, and 69% of Republicans).
- Drilling for oil in Alaska's Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (30% of registered voters, 18% of Democrats, 27% of Independents, and 44% of Republicans).

Additionally:

• Many registered voters (59%; 84% of Democrats, 56% of Independents, and 35% of Republicans) would support a U.S. president declaring global warming a national emergency if Congress does not act. Support for this proposition among all registered voters has increased by 14 percentage points since we first asked this question in April 2019.

The Green New Deal

• More than half of registered voters (57%) have heard at least "a little" about the policy proposal called the "Green New Deal." The Green New Deal proposal has the support of about seven in ten registered voters (72%; 95% of Democrats, 69% of Independents, and 48% of Republicans).

The Paris Climate Agreement

• About three in four registered voters (77%; 94% of Democrats, 76% of Independents, and 58% of Republicans) support U.S. participation in the Paris Climate Agreement. Majorities of Democrats (93%) and Independents (66%), but not Republicans (31%), also oppose President Trump's decision to pull out of the Agreement.

Individual and Collective Action to Reduce Global Warming

- About one in four registered voters (28%) would support an organization engaging in non-violent civil disobedience against corporate or government activities that make global warming worse, if a person they like and respect asked them to. About one in six registered voters (16%) say they would personally engage in non-violent civil disobedience if asked by a person they like and respect.
- If asked by a person they like and respect, 33% of registered voters would contact government officials about global warming and 29% would meet with elected officials or their staff about it. However, fewer Americans have actually taken these actions in the past year only 13% say they have contacted an elected official during the past 12 months to urge them to take action to reduce global warming.
- Only 2% of Americans say they are currently participating in a campaign to convince elected officials to take action to reduce global warming. However, an additional 8% say they "definitely would" participate in such a campaign, and another 24% say they "probably would."





Mitigation and Adaptation Policies

- About half of registered voters (51%) say the U.S. federal government should respond to global warming both by reducing its causes *and* preparing for its impacts. About three in ten (29%) say the federal government's main priority should be focusing on the causes of global warming, while seven percent say the main priority should be focusing on its impacts.
- Registered voters hold mixed opinions about what the U.S. federal government should do to assist communities that are becoming uninhabitable due to the effects of global warming. About half of Democrats (49%) think the federal government should help move these communities to safer ground nearby while about four in ten Republicans (42%) think the federal government should let the communities take care of themselves.

Acting on Global Warming

- Across party lines, a majority of registered voters say corporations and industry should do more to address global warming (72% of registered voters, 89% of Democrats, 76% of Independents, and 55% of Republicans).
- At least half of registered voters think citizens (66%), the U.S. Congress (63%), the Republican Party (62%), President Trump (62%), their own member of Congress (58%), the Democratic Party (57%), local government officials (56%), their governor (54%), the media (51%), and/or they themselves (50%) should do more to address global warming.
- A majority of Democrats (83%), about half of Independents (56%), but only about one in five Republicans (22%) think global warming should be a very high or high priority for the president and Congress. Developing sources of clean energy has far stronger support across party lines (92% of Democrats, 71% of Independents, and 47% of Republicans think it should be a very high or high priority).






1. The Politics of Global Warming Beliefs

1.1. Most registered voters think global warming is happening.

Three in four registered voters (75%) think global warming is happening, the highest level recorded since our surveys began in 2008. This includes nearly all liberal Democrats (98%) and moderate/conservative Democrats (92%; the highest level recorded for that group), and about seven in ten liberal/moderate Republicans (69%). In contrast, only about half of conservative Republicans (47%) think global warming is happening.

Do you think global warming is happening? [% responding "yes"] April 2020.










1.2. A majority of registered voters think global warming is caused mostly by human activities.

About six in ten registered voters (61%) think global warming is caused mostly by human activities. This includes large majorities of liberal Democrats (92%) and moderate/conservative Democrats (77%), both at their highest levels since our surveys began in 2008.

Half of liberal/moderate Republicans (50%) think global warming is mostly human-caused while only 30% of conservative Republicans think so.


1.3. Two in three registered voters are worried about global warming.

Two in three registered voters (66%) are "very" or "somewhat" worried about global warming. This includes nearly all liberal Democrats (97%) and a large majority of moderate/conservative Democrats (85%).

About half of liberal/moderate Republicans (55%) are worried about global warming. Only about one in four conservative Republicans (27%) are worried.

2. Global Warming as a Voting Issue

2.1. Most Democrats say global warming will be a very important issue when deciding who they will vote for in the 2020 presidential election.

Global warming is the 13th most highly ranked issue registered voters say will be "very important" to their vote in the 2020 presidential election, with 43% saying it will be very important (see Data Tables, pp. 48–57). This is within the margin of error of our previous survey, in November 2019, when 45% of registered voters said it would be very important to their vote, and is five percentage points higher than in our survey one year ago (April 2019), when 38% of registered voters said so.

Among Democrats, seven in ten (70%) say global warming will be a very important issue in determining their vote for president (compared with 72% in November 2019 and 64% in April 2019). This includes 82% of liberal Democrats and 57% of moderate/conservative Democrats. Global warming is the 2nd most important voting issue among liberal Democrats while environmental protection is 3rd. Among moderate/conservative Democrats, global warming ranks 8th, with environmental protection 9th. By contrast, global warming is near or at the bottom of presidential voting priorities among Republicans.

In 2020, there will be an election to choose the U.S. president. As of today, how important will the following issues be to you when you decide who you will vote for in the 2020 Presidential election?









After each respondent rated how important each of the 30 issues would be to their vote in the 2020 Presidential election, we showed them the list of issues they had rated highest and then asked, "Which one of these issues is the *most* important issue to you when voting for a candidate?"

Using this method, global warming is the #9 ranked voting issue among all registered voters, with 4% of registered voters saying it is their *most important issue* (see Data Tables, p. 58). For context "the economy" is the #1 *most important issue* for registered voters, with 18% saying it is the *most important issue*.

Among Democrats, global warming is *most important* voting issue #4 (8% of Democrats), with healthcare #1 (17% of Democrats). Global warming is the #2 *most important issue* among liberal Democrats (10% of liberal Democrats) and #9 among moderate/conservative Democrats (4% of moderate/conservative Democrats). Global warming was near the bottom of the *most important issue* list for Republicans.

2.2. Registered voters are more likely to vote for a presidential candidate who strongly supports taking action to reduce global warming.

Registered voters say they are more likely to vote for a presidential candidate who strongly supports taking action to reduce global warming. When asked if they would be more or less likely to vote for a presidential candidate who strongly supports action to reduce global warming, or if it would make no difference, registered voters are three times as likely to say they would be more likely (49%), rather than less likely (16%) to vote for such a candidate, a net difference of +33 percentage points.

Democrats say they are much more likely than less likely to vote for a presidential candidate who strongly supports taking action to reduce global warming (+74 percentage points, an increase of 13 percentage points since we last asked this question at the same point in the presidential cycle in March 2016). Likewise, Independents and liberal/moderate Republicans say they are both +22 points more likely to vote for such a candidate. Conservative Republicans, however, say they are less likely to vote for such a candidate (-27 points).

Democrats say they are more likely to voice support on social media for a candidate who supports taking action to reduce global warming (+33 points, an increase of seven percentage points since March 2016). Republicans, conversely, say they are less likely to voice support on social media (-26 points). Democrats say they are more likely to donate money to the campaign of a presidential candidate who supports climate action (+31 points, an increase of 10 percentage points since March 2016), but Independents and Republicans say they are less likely to (-11 and -33 points, respectively).

2.3. Registered voters are less likely to vote for a presidential candidate who strongly opposes taking action to reduce global warming.

Conversely, Americans say they are less likely to vote for a presidential candidate who strongly *opposes* taking action to reduce global warming. When asked if they would be more or less willing to vote for a presidential candidate who strongly opposes action to reduce global warming, registered voters say they would be more likely to vote *against* such a candidate, than to vote for them by a margin of about 5 to 1 (55% vs. 10%, respectively, a net difference of -45 percentage points).

Democrats, Independents, and liberal/moderate Republicans all say they are *less* likely to vote for a candidate who opposes climate action: Democrats, -77 percentage points (a larger difference by 14 percentage points from the last time we asked this question at the same point in the presidential cycle in March 2016); Independents, -46 percentage points (a larger difference by 15 percentage points since March 2016); liberal/moderate Republicans, -35 points (a larger difference by 11 percentage points since March 2016). Conservative Republicans, however, say they are *more* likely to vote for such a candidate (+5 percentage points).

Democrats, Independents, and Republicans say they are less likely to voice support on social media (-59, -28, and -10 percentage points, respectively), or donate money to the campaign of a candidate who opposes climate action (-66, -36, and -13 points, respectively).




2.4. A majority of registered voters say the candidates' views on global warming will be important in determining their vote in 2020.

More than half of registered voters say the candidates' views on global warming will be one of several important issues in determining their vote for president in 2020 (57%), with an additional three percent saying it will be *the* most important single issue. A large majority of Democrats say global warming will be one of several important issues (81%) or the most important issue (4%). About half of Independents say it will be one of several issues (49%) or the most important issue (3%). More than half of Republicans (57%) say the candidates' views on global warming will *not* be an important issue in determining their vote for president.

The proportion of Democrats who say the candidates' views on global warming will be one of several important issues in determining their vote for president has increased by 14 percentage points since we last asked this question at the same point in the 2016 presidential election cycle (in <u>March 2016</u>).

3. Support for Policies to Address the Pollution that Causes Global Warming

3.1. Most registered voters, including Republicans, support climate-friendly energy policies.

Registered voters across the political spectrum support several other energy policies designed to reduce carbon pollution and fossil fuel dependence and to promote clean energy, including:

- Funding more research into renewable energy sources: 87% of registered voters, 96% of Democrats, 85% of Independents, and 78% of Republicans.
- Generating renewable energy (solar and wind) on public land in the U.S.: 86% of registered voters, 93% of Democrats, 89% of Independents, and 78% of Republicans.
- Providing tax rebates to people who purchase energy-efficient vehicles or solar panels: 83% of registered voters, 92% of Democrats, 82% of Independents, and 75% of Republicans.
- Regulating carbon dioxide as a pollutant: 76% of registered voters, 93% of Democrats, 76% of Independents, and 57% of Republicans.
- Requiring electric utilities to produce at least 20% of their electricity from renewable energy sources, even if it costs the average household an extra \$100 a year: 66% of registered voters, 86% of Democrats, 56% of Independents, but fewer than half of Republicans (46%).

Nearly three in four *conservative* Republicans support funding more research into renewable energy (73%), generating renewable energy on public land (73%), and providing tax rebates for purchasing energy-efficient vehicles or solar panels (73%), and about half (49%) support regulating carbon dioxide.

3.2. Registered voters are split on fossil-fuel production policies.

Half of registered voters support expanding offshore drilling for oil and natural gas off the U.S. coast (50%), and more than four in ten support drilling and mining for fossil fuels on public land in the U.S. (45%). Majorities of Republicans (71%) and Independents (55%) support expanding offshore drilling and a majority of Republicans support drilling and mining on public lands (69%). Fewer Democrats support these policies.

By contrast, fewer registered voters (30%) support drilling for oil in Alaska's Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR), while a large majority (70%) oppose it (see Data Tables, p. 64). About half of conservative Republicans (51%) support this policy, but liberal/moderate Republicans (32%), Independents (27%), and Democrats (18%) are much less likely to support drilling in ANWR.


3.3. A majority of registered voters support requiring fossil fuel companies to pay a carbon tax.

A policy for mitigating global warming currently under consideration is often referred to as a "revenue-neutral carbon tax." It would require fossil fuel companies to pay a tax on the carbon pollution they produce, and would use that money to reduce other taxes (such as the Federal income tax) by an equal amount. About two in three registered voters (68%) support this plan.

A large majority of Democrats (85%) and a majority of Independents (68%) support requiring fossil fuel companies to pay a carbon tax. About half of Republicans (49%), including two in three liberal/moderate Republicans (66%), but only 38% of conservative Republicans, support such a tax.


3.4. A majority of registered voters support a "Fee and Dividend" policy for carbon pollution.

A proposal similar to a "revenue-neutral carbon tax" (see previous section) is a "Fee and Dividend" policy² in which fossil fuel companies would pay a fee on the carbon pollution they produce, and all the money collected would be distributed to all U.S. citizens, in equal amounts, through monthly dividend checks.

Six in ten registered voters (60%) support a Fee and Dividend plan, including a majority of Democrats (76%) and 57% of Independents. About four in ten Republicans (42%) support the plan, including 60% of liberal/moderate Republicans but only 31% of conservative Republicans.




3.5. A majority of registered voters would support a president declaring a national emergency to act on global warming.

About six in ten registered voters (59%) would "strongly" or "somewhat" support a U.S. president declaring global warming a national emergency to act on it without Congress. This reflects a 14 percentage-point increase since we first asked this question one year ago (in April 2019). This action has the support of a large majority of Democrats (84%; a 19-point increase over the past year), about half of Independents (56%; a 24-point increase), and about one in three Republicans (35%; a nine-point increase).

If Congress does not take action on global warming, how much would you support or oppose a U.S. president declaring a national emergency to act on it without Congress?










4. The Green New Deal

4.1. Liberal Democrats and conservative Republicans have heard the most about the "Green New Deal."

More than half of registered voters (57%) have heard at least "a little" about the policy proposal called the "Green New Deal" (see section 4.2 for a description of the policy), and about one in five (21%) have heard "a lot" about it. Liberal Democrats are the most likely to have heard about the Green New Deal (74%), followed by conservative Republicans (66%), who are the most likely to report having heard "a lot" about it.

How much, if anything, have you heard about a policy being proposed by some members of Congress called the "Green New Deal"?










4.2. A majority of registered voters support a "Green New Deal."

As we reported <u>last year</u>, a majority of registered voters support the policy aspirations included in the Green New Deal, although support decreased during the time period between December 2018 and April 2019, particularly among conservative Republicans and regular viewers of the Fox News Channel.³ The description of the policy was summarized based on a 2018 policy report:⁴ "the Green New Deal will produce jobs and strengthen America's economy by accelerating the transition from fossil fuels to clean, renewable energy. The Deal would generate 100% of the nation's electricity from clean, renewable sources within the next 10 years; upgrade the nation's energy grid, buildings, and transportation infrastructure; increase energy efficiency; invest in green technology research and development; and provide training for jobs in the new green economy."

As of April 2020, about seven in ten registered voters (72%) support the Green New Deal as described above, including a large majority of Democrats (95%) and a majority of Independents (69%). About half of Republicans (48%), including two in three liberal/moderate Republicans (66%) but fewer conservative Republicans (37%) also support the Green New Deal. Support for the Green New Deal among those in the "middle" of the ideological spectrum has trended upward over the past year (since our April 2019 survey), with support among moderate/conservative Democrats, Independents, and liberal/moderate Republicans each increasing by five percentage points.

5. The Paris Climate Agreement


5.1. There is bipartisan support for U.S. participation in the Paris Climate Agreement.

In December 2015, officials from 197 countries (nearly every country in the world) met in Paris at the United Nations Climate Change Conference and negotiated a global agreement to limit global warming. On Earth Day, April 2016, the United States and 174 other countries signed the agreement, with all of the other countries following suit. On June 1 2017, President Trump announced that the United States will withdraw from the agreement, and on November 4 2019, his administration began the formal process of withdrawing.

In contrast to President Trump's decision, about three in four registered voters (77%) support U.S. participation in the Paris Climate Agreement. Support varies by party, with nearly all Democrats (94%), about three in four Independents (76%), and more than half of Republicans (58%) supporting U.S. participation.

Similarly, a majority of registered voters (63%) oppose President Trump's decision to pull out of the Paris Climate Agreement, including 93% of Democrats and 66% of Independents, but only 31% of Republicans.

6. Individual and Collective Action to Reduce Global Warming

6.1. Many registered voters are willing to take political actions to reduce global warming.

About half of registered voters (51%) say they would vote for a candidate for public office because of the candidate's position on global warming if a person they like and respect asked them to. This includes a large majority of Democrats (78%), and about half of Independents (53%), but only about one in four Republicans (23%).

About four in ten registered voters would publicly wear a t-shirt or display a t-shirt, bumper sticker, etc. about global warming (43%) if a person they like and respect asked them to. Fewer would donate money (35%) or volunteer their time (33%) to an organization working on global warming, or contact (33%) or meet with (29%) government officials about global warming,

About one in four registered voters (28%) say they would support an organization engaging in non-violent civil disobedience against corporate or government activities that make global warming worse, and about one in six (16%) say they would personally engage in non-violent civil disobedience.

Overall, Democrats are most likely to say they would take these actions, with many liberal Democrats saying they would take them. Independents and Republicans are less likely to say they would take these actions.




6.2. About one in three Americans would join, or are already participating in, a campaign to convince elected officials to take action to reduce global warming.

A total of about one in three registered voters (34%) are either participating (2%), definitely would participate (8%), or probably would participate (24%) in a campaign to convince elected officials to take action to reduce global warming. This includes a majority of Democrats (57%; 68% of liberal Democrats and 45% of moderate/conservative Democrats), three in ten Independents (31%), and 12% of Republicans (20% of liberal/moderate Republicans and 8% of conservative Republicans).

The percentage of registered voters who are participating or would participate in such a campaign has increased by seven percentage points over the past year (since our April 2019 survey), particularly among Democrats (+15 percentage points). This is due primarily to an increase in the percentage of Americans who say they are *willing* to participate in a campaign rather than an increase in the percentage who are already participating in one.



6.3. Few registered voters have urged an elected official to take action to reduce global warming during the past 12 months.

About one in eight registered voters (13%) say they have contacted an elected official during the past 12 months to urge them to take action to reduce global warming. However, about one in four Democrats (23%), including 33% of liberal Democrats, say they have done so. Additionally, 9% of Independents, but only 3% of Republicans, say they have contacted an elected official to urge them to take action to reduce global warming.




7. Mitigation and Adaptation Policies

7.1. About half of registered voters think the U.S. federal government should prioritize both climate mitigation and adaptation.

About half of registered voters (51%) think the U.S. federal government should prioritize climate mitigation (reducing the causes of global warming) and adaptation (preparing for the impacts of global warming) about equally, with an additional three in ten (29%) saying the main priority should be mitigation, and 7% saying it should be adaptation. Thirteen percent of registered voters (including about one in four Republicans; 24%) say the federal government should not prioritize either of these approaches.




7.2. Registered voters are mixed regarding how to assist communities affected by global warming.

Registered voters hold mixed opinions about what the U.S. federal government should do to assist communities that are becoming uninhabitable due to the effects of global warming such as increasing sea level rise, flooding, or wildfires. About one in five (19%) think the government should help these communities remain in their current locations, while more (39%) think the federal government should help communities move to safer ground nearby. Fewer (17%) think the government should help relocate people to other parts of the country. About one in four registered voters (24%) think the government should let the communities take care of themselves.

Democrats are most likely to say the federal government should help communities move to safer ground nearby (49%) while Republicans are most likely to say the communities should take care of themselves (42%).

8. Who is Responsible for Action on Global Warming?

8.1. About seven in ten registered voters want corporations and industry to do more to address global warming. Most voters also want more action from citizens and government.


Across party lines, registered voters say corporations and industry should do more to address global warming (72% of all registered voters; including 89% of Democrats, 76% of Independents, and 55% of Republicans).

Half or more of Democrats, Independents, and liberal/moderate Republicans, think citizens, the U.S. Congress, the Republican Party, President Trump, their own member of Congress, the Democratic Party, their local government officials, and their governor should do more to address global warming (see Data Tables, pp. 76–79). Majorities of Democrats (71%) and Independents (58%) think they themselves should do more, while a minority of Republicans (29%) think so.

About half of liberal/moderate Republicans (54%) think their party (the Republican Party) should do more to address global warming, while only one in four conservative Republicans (24%) think so. Large majorities of both liberal Democrats (86%) and moderate/conservative Democrats (73%) think their party (the Democratic Party) should do more. Majorities of Independents think the Republican Party (67%) and the Democratic Party (61%) should do more.


8.2. Most Democrats think global warming should be a "high" or "very high" priority for the president and Congress. About half of Independents also think so.

A large majority of Democrats (83%) think global warming should be a high or very high priority for the president and Congress. About half of Independents (56%) also think global warming should be a high priority, but relatively few Republicans (22%) think so.

Over the past five years (since March 2015), the percentage of Democrats who think global warming should be a high priority for the president and Congress has increased by 16 percentage points (see Data Tables, p. 42).


8.3. Most registered voters think developing sources of clean energy should be a "high" or "very high" priority for the president and Congress.

Majorities of Democrats (92%) and Independents (71%), more than four in ten Republicans (47%), think developing sources of clean energy should be a high or very high priority for the president and Congress.

Democrats think both global warming (83%; see previous section) and developing sources of clean energy (92%) should be high priorities for the president and Congress. In contrast, Independents (71% vs. 56%), and Republicans (47% vs. 22%) are more likely to think clean energy should be a priority than to think global warming should be a priority.

The data in this report are based on a nationally representative survey of 1,029 American adults, aged 18 and older, 911 of whom are registered to vote. The survey was conducted April 7 – 17, 2020. All questionnaires were self-administered by respondents in a web-based environment. The survey took, on average, about 25 minutes to complete.

The sample was drawn from the Ipsos (formerly GfK) KnowledgePanel®, an online panel of members drawn using probability sampling methods. Prospective members are recruited using a combination of random digit dial and address-based sampling techniques that cover virtually all (non-institutional) resident phone numbers and addresses in the United States. Those contacted who would choose to join the panel but do not have access to the Internet are loaned computers and given Internet access so they may participate.

The sample therefore includes a representative cross-section of American adults – irrespective of whether they have Internet access, use only a cell phone, etc. Key demographic variables were weighted, post survey, to match US Census Bureau norms.

From November 2008 to December 2018, no KnowledgePanel® member participated in more than one *Climate Change in the American Mind* (CCAM) survey. Beginning with the April 2019 survey, panel members who have participated in CCAM surveys in the past, excluding the most recent two surveys, may be randomly selected for participation. In the current survey, 312 respondents, 267 of whom are registered voters included in this report, participated in a previous CCAM survey.

The survey instrument was designed by Anthony Leiserowitz, Seth Rosenthal, Matthew Ballew, Matthew Goldberg, Abel Gustafson, and Parrish Bergquist of Yale University, and Edward Maibach and John Kotcher of George Mason University.

Margins of error

All samples are subject to some degree of sampling error – that is, statistical results obtained from a sample can be expected to differ somewhat from results that would be obtained if every member of the target population was interviewed. Average margins of error, at the 95% confidence level, are as follows:

- All Registered Voters (N = 911): Plus or minus 3 percentage points.
- Democrats (total; n = 393): Plus or minus 5 points.
- Liberal Democrats (n = 208): Plus or minus 7 points.
- Moderate/conservative Democrats (n = 183): Plus or minus 7 points.
- Independents (n = 76): Plus or minus 11 points.
- Republicans (total; n = 409): Plus or minus 5 points.
- Liberal/moderate Republicans (n = 145): Plus or minus 8 points.
- Conservative Republicans (n = 264): Plus or minus 6 points.
